I was shown some of the wonderful projects the club has completed and walked along the riverbank enjoying the many sculptures along the way. The walk finished at the Clubs project to provide exercise equipment for the community to use. The club has large sheds on Council ground to store all their goods in. This year President Dan is hoping to fund a BBQ area on crown land, support the Backpacks for Kids program and re invigorate the membership drive. It was a big turnout for my visit supported by the Mayor and the Bowling Club Secretary.

MUSINGS FROM DG DEBBIE CONT.

Wednesday, I found myself at the Commercial Hotel in Boggabri, hosted by President Alex McKenzie. The freezing cold night was offset by the warm welcome and the shot of port to send me on my way back to Narrabri. This club is the undisputed kings of battery recycling. I was given all the facts on collection, storage and shipment of high-risk products. The batteries are smelted in Newcastle. The board astonished me with the \$500 to \$600 per tonne for the old batteries. I was speaking about relevant projects for communities and this one must certainly be relevant when I was told that the cotton industry go through a tonne of batteries every two years. The club shares and alternates fundraisers with the local Lions club.

Thursday I was in Narrabri for the day. President Graheme Herbert gave me the grand tour of some of the club projects. There were plenty to observe. Planting trees, BBQ areas, exercise equipment in the park. They built the clock tower in the town centre. The highlight of the day was a visit to Graheme and Julies des res to look at the 'you beaut!, whizz bang, swiss army knife of a BBQ trailer, designed by Graheme and waiting for its Rotary wrap. This trailer is built with women in mind. The criteria from PP Julie was that three women must be able to operate it. The trailer has two large Eskis on the front with space for a generator. Solar panels on the roof power a 240-volt battery, that provides lighting and hot and cold running water for the stainless sink. A shelf underneath stores tables and chair. Each side of the trailer lifts to provide shelter and inside are two gas powered BBQ's that swing out for easy access. There is a pull-down preparation area or table. This was an outstanding achievement! At the meeting that evening I was lucky to meet with up with Barry Keys who joined the Rotary Club of Narrabri when he was 28 years old, some 58 years ago. Congratulations Barry.

I wonder if there are any other Rotary members in the District who have been a member of their club for longer than 58 years. Let me know.
