## MUSINGS FROM THE DG

I hope everyone enjoyed Australia Day in their own special way and had some time to reconnect with friends and families. It is also a time of reflection for many. For me it was remembering my ancestor Henry Hacking who was a Quarter Master on the HMS Sirius. Port Hacking south of Sydney is named after Henry Hacking by Matthew Flinders in 1796. Sounds good doesn't it. His life went downhill a bit after that, and he found himself in court many times. He was granted a conditional pardon and ended up in Hobart. He was superintendent of the Port of Hobart in 1819 and eventually dies July 1831 in Hobart hospital aged 81. He is buried at St David's Hobart. Congratulations to everyone who received an award this year. BIG congratulations to Ken Hall (9650 E Club) who was named Citizen of the Year in Tamworth. I have been very busy with all things conference this week. I was even a guest speaker at my own club to talk about what we are doing and see if anyone would like to help on the day. My conference committee under the chairmanship of Neil Black from the Rotary Club of Port Sunrise have been amazing in their support. Thanks to Valda Sturrock for her expertise in managing the registrations.

Could I draw your attention to our centenary project - Rotary's "Longest Washing Line of Socks" World Record Attempt - a D9650 Rotary Centenary Celebration Event. This event apart from being fun is about our Public Image and about fundraising to support our Rotary programs, including Lifeline. On 17 May 2014, a group of about 30 young adults in Germany completed the building of a washing line 6.066 kilometres long with 69,152 socks pegged to it and set a new Guinness World Record. That record still stands but not for much longer! Port Macquarie, NSW, Australia is where this record will be smashed in 2021. The challenge is being led by Rotary and, as far as we know, it is the only major event in our District 9650 that is a celebration of 100 years of Rotary in Australia. Sovereign Hills (part of the Lewis Land Group) is the major local sponsor (up to \$30,000) and the site of the challenge is adjacent to the new Sovereign Place Shopping Centre in the heart of the Sovereign Hills residential and commercial development precinct a fast-developing suburb on the western outskirts of Port Macquarie. Rotary aims to build a washing line TEN kilometres long with over 100,000 socks pegged to it. The public launch of the challenge is planned for early February 2021 at Sovereign Place. The building of the 10.0 kilometre washing line is planned for early June 2021. Once built, an estimated thousand people of all ages will (working in small teams to a timetable and complying with social distancing and other Covid-safe requirements), take part in the orderly pegging to it of over 100,000 socks on a Friday and Saturday with Sunday in reserve. A Melbourne business, Activated Eco, a supplier of stainless-steel clothes pegs, is providing, on loan, up to 150,000 of these pegs for the challenge and also attending the event. Why are we doing this? A few reasons:

- To celebrate in a novel way the centenary of Rotary in Australia and the bicentenary of Port Macquarie
- To promote some messages about caring for our environment
- To provide an event in which everybody can be involved in some way
- To increase our community's knowledge of and support for four not-for-profit groups and to provide them with seriously needed funds.

We are engaging ten sponsors (up to \$5,000 each) – one for each of the 1.0-kilometre sections of washing line. We will be appealing to our Port Macquarie Hastings community to not only donate their unwanted/tired/lonely socks but also whatever money they can afford to help these four not-for-profits. We want to be able to say to our community that each dollar donated is being matched by a dollar from our major sponsor and our ten-line sponsors (i.e.10 cents from each of the 10 line sponsors). We are appealing to all our D9650 clubs to help us smash this Guinness World Record and give our public-at-large a different view of what Rotary takes on. Let us show them that we are not just about raffles, barbecues, book sales, building public amenities ... which is what most people see. Please get behind this event, anyone can assist with their old sock or the ones that lost their partner in the washing machine!

## 2021 Rotary Convention Now Virtual Message from RIP Holger Knaack

Dear friends,

By now we have sadly grown accustomed to hearing of the need to shift major public events to being held virtually rather than face to face. Unfortunately, the Rotary Board of Directors was compelled to again make the difficult decision to celebrate this year's International Convention as a virtual event. While this may not be an unexpected decision, it is still a deeply disappointing one – for us and for our friends in Taiwan who have been planning an exceptional event.

I want to thank the Host Committee for the admirable job they did building support for what surely would have been one of Rotary's finest events. We had hoped that a combination of vaccine uptake and public health measures would have brought the COVID-19 pandemic under control. We all know that in many parts of the world the pandemic is still raging and we must maintain our vigilance and patience before resuming major public gatherings. Taiwan has done an admirable job managing the pandemic – and local Rotarians were still eager to host and celebrate with us. Under the guidance of the World Health Organization and the local public health organization in Taiwan, it became clear that an event of this scale would be impossible to host safely. While we are disappointed that we could not have a traditional convention, we are excited about the virtual event being planned for all Rotarians worldwide.

Last year's convention attracted significant viewership during its weeklong program. This year, we will channel all we have learned about staging the very best in virtual events into a program that promises to open new opportunities for you to be entertained, enlightened and energized. We will share more details about the 2021 Virtual Convention soon.

This includes purchases made for the Rotaract and Youth Exchange and the Intercountry Committees pre-convention events, and ticketed meal events. # POLIO UPDATE

Our campaign to end polio has faced many challenges in the last two years, not least the impact of the Covid pandemic. Cases of wild polio jumped in Pakistan and cases of 'circulating vaccine derived' polio became a serious problem in equatorial Africa. These setbacks were related to issues such as political distractions, Taliban resistance and virus mutations following the use of the 'mOPV2' vaccine. Great progress has been made with these issues:

- Governments have refocussed and there were zero cases in Pakistan in December
- Discussions have commenced with the Taliban
- A new vaccine, 'Novel OPV2' was introduced in October, and it is dramatically less likely to mutate. Eradicating a disease is no easy task but we are now back on track.

# BOOKS FOR CHANGE PROJECT TARGET IN SIGHT

An article in the D9650 E-Newsletter in July 2020 outlined the background to the Books of Change project initiated by the Rotary Club of Port Macquarie Sunrise. The project aims to provide 50 boxes of science books and early learning materials specific to Aboriginal culture to selected remote primary schools in western NSW. To achieve this goal, Sunrise Rotary needs to raise \$5,000 to match a \$5,000 Rotary Australia Compassionate Grant which has been obtained and will be allocated to the project on a dollar for dollar basis.

Sunrise Rotary is delighted with the response to the call for donations and over \$4,000 has so far been raised. However, whilst the target of \$5,000 is in sight only a few more weeks are available before the deadline for donations will be reached. Therefore a further appeal is being made to members of Rotary and others to contribute to this project and help make a difference through the fabulous Deadly Science program. # NYSF 2021

Emily Madirazza <emily@madirazza.net> Our candidate for NYSF in January 2020 – I thought I might give you an update on NYSF 2021 as my experience last year in 2020 was not as thrilling as had been promised. Therefore, NYSF promised a refund for the "portion of funding that my family contributed. Instead of this, I elected to go to the completely digital NYSF 2021. It was well worth it this year. Some of the highlights were:

- A medical science cross to the SAMWRI in South Australia. The researchers including Early Career Fellow Melissa Cantley told us about their work on blood cancers and how 50% of people with multiple myeloma die. This is because this type of cancer is usually diagnosed when it reaches distant parts of the body. These researchers are working on how to improve the survival rate of people with this type of cancer through analysing the role of the bone microenvironment in its progression from pre-cancerous stages. I had no idea there was a microenvironment inside our bones!
- An interesting presentation on genomics from Professor Vanessa Hayes from the University of Sydney. She told us about how she sequenced the first African human genomes from an individual called Celsisi. She described how the people that were ancestrally closest to us – people who live in Africa – have far more diverse genomes than we do and this changes their microbiome and reduces their susceptibility to disease. I was honestly astonished at the difference in diversity between Western people and people of African descent! She also described the difference between genomics and genetics – apparently genomics is the study of the relationships between all our genes while genetics looks at the composition and function of a single gene. I always thought they were the same! I was inspired by how she traced the origin of modern humans back to a Botswanan homeland by utilizing the multidisciplinary nature of science.

There were also several other interesting presentations! I loved the podcast / panel interviews about science communication and various prominent scientists – like Cathy Foley! – weighing in on where they think science will take us! I was glad to see PDG Ken Hall talking about his achievements in helping to eradicate polio. I am glad that it is only endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan. People don't deserve to suffer.

This year, I am starting a Bachelor of Genetics at ANU in Canberra. I also hope to join the Rotaract Club down there. As always, thank you so much for both the financial and moral support you have provided to me and other young people with ambition and drive just like me! I love how your organization strives to take action however you can, not waiting on others to act first. Sincerely – Emily

As most of you know by now, The Rotary Foundation Trustees and Rotary International Board of Directors have approved adding a new area of focus: supporting the environment.

Supporting the environment joins peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; and community economic development.

Over the past several years, more than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has gone towards environment-based projects. Now with this approved and added area of focus, grant applications for projects will be accepted from 1 July 2021.

From a communications perspective this is a great time to work on proactive story mining.

As Rotary's Sr. Coordinator in Communications and Public Relations I am on the lookout for stories we can promote to an external audience via social media, newspapers, magazines, radio and television.

When the time is right, I'd like to try and assist Rotary members in placing stories in media and hopefully spread the word.
